DRY STACK



- Tight fit dry stack application.
- No gap between stones, creating a seamless, pure stack stone look.
- Individual stones are meticulously placed one by one.
- Ensuring stones fit tightly together can be a time-consuming process.
- Ideal for traditional aesthetics and a rustic feel.



GROUT JOINTS



- Similar to tile installation, with a joint of half an inch between stones.
- Joints are filled with mortar colored to match or complement the stone.
- Typically occupies 10-15% of the wall surface, depending on the project.
- Each stone is individually placed, allowing for customization and variation.
- Offers a classic appearance and added stability to the structure.



PANELIZED



- Comprised of multiple stones arranged in one-size panels.
- Mimics the dry stack look but without visible mortar lines.
- Provides a modern aesthetic and clean finish.
- Each panel contains 4-8 stones, streamlining the installation process.
- Offers a quicker installation than traditional dry stack or grout line methods.
